Where Do They Go?

The butterflies rest in trees along the way and sometimes gather in huge groups that cover the trees, looking like bright orange leaves.

How Do They Find Their Way?

Even though monarch butterflies have never made the journey before, they know exactly where to go. Scientists think they use the sun and the Earth's magnetic field to help guide them. They always find their way to the same forests year after year!



A Long Journey

The trip is very long and takes weeks or even months. Some butterflies don't make it all the way, but many do. Once they reach their warm winter home, they rest, drink nectar, and wait for spring to come.
