Yellowstone National Park: America's First Wonderland

Deep in the Rocky Mountains, between Wyoming, Montana, and Idaho, lies Yellowstone National Park - the very first national park in the world! Established in 1872, this magical place protects incredible natural wonders that you won't find anywhere else.

A Land of Fire and Water

Yellowstone sits on top of a sleeping supervolcano! This giant volcano heats up the ground, creating:

- Geysers that shoot steaming water high into the air (like Old Faithful, which erupts every 90 minutes!)
- Hot springs in rainbow colors, caused by special heat-loving bacteria
- Bubbling mud pots that gurgle like a giant's breakfast cereal

Wildlife Galore

The park is like a giant animal sanctuary:

- Bison (the heaviest land animals in North America) roam the grasslands
- Gray wolves hunt in the forests (brought back from near extinction in 1995!)
- Elk bugle loudly in the fall, while bald eagles soar overhead

Adventure Awaits!

Visitors to Yellowstone can:

- Walk on boardwalks past steaming geysers
- Spot bears (from a safe distance!)
- Camp under some of the darkest night skies in America
- · Learn from park rangers about geology and wildlife

Protecting Paradise

- Park rules help keep Yellowstone wild:
- Stay on trails (the ground near hot springs is thin and dangerous)
- Never feed animals (human food makes them sick)
- Take only pictures (leave everything else untouched)
